BNHS's Bird Count at Sanjay Gandhi National Park in Mumbai Records 67 Species in a day

(Mumbai-02/7/2024):- Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS), India's premier nature conservation organised a Bird Count at SGNP in June. Despite the rains the count recorded 67 species for the day.

On June 30, 2024, over 46 dedicated volunteers participated in a Bird Count at Sanjay Gandhi National Park (SGNP), as part of the BNHS's SGNP Bird Monitoring Programme. By the end of the day, the team had recorded 67 bird species, reaffirming the park's status as a hotspot for avian diversity. This monthly Bird Count is a key activity that highlights the park's incredible biodiversity and encourages community involvement in wildlife conservation.

The total number of recorded bird species in the region has now reached 232. The BNHS invites nature enthusiasts to join these monthly counts and contribute to the ongoing efforts in preserving and understanding the rich avian life in the park. The bird monitoring programme is supported by the staff of SGNP & Tungareshwar Wildlife Sanctuary Forest Department, led by the Director, Sri G. Mallikarjuna (IFS – Chief Conservator of Forests) and Sri Sudhir Sonawale (Assistant Conservator of Forests, SGNP). With support from the BNHS Director Sri Kishor Rithe, the count is coordinated by Mr Asif N.
